From the Principal

Our Vision and Mission statement states, as one of our goals, that we will “work in partnership with parents in the education and socialisation of students.” As we journey into our *Learning at Home* program this goal has taken on a whole new meaning! When it was originally written there were no thoughts of a global pandemic. However now that there is perhaps our goal is more important than ever.

I don't think it is any surprise when I say that some students will thrive on learning at home, whilst others will hate it and long for the day they can re-enter the classroom and school with all of its routines and social life.

Similarly, some parents and carers will thrive facilitating learning at home as it will allow them to spend more time with their children as well as getting a grasp on what children are actually learning at school. But of course some parents and carers will find it difficult for many reasons, the least of which may be that they are trying to work from home themselves whilst trying to facilitate their children's learning.

Some of our parents and carers may have always dreamed of home-schooling their children but their own work prevented them from doing that, or may have always had in the back of their mind that they wanted to be a teacher. Learning at Home may give them a small taste of what that's about. But it may also give a taste of what our teachers do every day (and quite often into the evenings) to ensure a quality education.

Because teaching is not just about delivering a lesson. It's also about planning and preparing materials for that lesson. It's about constantly reflecting on whether the aims of the lesson were met. It's about investigating whether students have learnt, how much they have learnt and how deep the learning is. It's about trying to balance time spent on individual aspects of the curriculum against covering the whole of the curriculum in the space of about 195 days. It's about marking work, giving feedback, looking at data, taking professional development opportunities, providing extra curricular activities, organising excursions, meeting deadlines, writing reports, attending meetings and making sure students with additional needs are able to access the curriculum.

In short, it's a very busy job. But of course it brings with it a lot of rewards, which is why teachers keep coming back. There are the day to day rewards of seeing students having a “lightbulb moment” as they pick up a concept, the longer term rewards as we look at our Year 10s at the end of the year and notice what fine young men and women they have become, and the even longer term rewards of having a past student come up to you in the street and thank you for how you helped them.

So, to all parents and carers out there who are facilitating *Learning at Home*, go easy on yourself. Just do the best you can do in your circumstance and, if only for a short time and in a different way, welcome to the club.

Learning from Home

Welcome to *Learning at Home*! Here are a couple of hints and tips to get you started:

- The work for the day is on Compass by 9am each morning. This week you'll get lots of emails and notifications reminding you it is there, but as time goes on these will start to disappear and you will know where the work is.
- It is helpful, especially for older students, to have a space set aside for them to do their work, along with a timetable for the day devised by you and your child.
- It will take us a week or so before we work out if the work we are setting is too much, not enough, or just right. So don't be too fussed if your child doesn't complete everything. It may just be a case that we haven't found that balance.
- Make use of the weekly Zoom meeting to check in with teachers, ask questions, or simply say hello. They are a good way to maintain contact.
- Most of our children with additional needs will be set work at their level. If you are having trouble finding this work, contact the school or Mrs Mac and we will hopefully be able to put you on the right track.
- And have fun! These weeks *Learning at Home* won't make or break your child's education, so don't get stressed about it! Just use it as a chance to get to know how your child is going academically and how you can assist.
