From the Principal

This week is Holy Week, the most important week on the Christian calendar. During this week we relive the last days of Jesus as he dies on the cross, then rejoice on Sunday as he rises to new life.

When Jesus died on the cross it must have been a time of great uncertainty for his followers. Everything they had believed in, everything they had thought about this man had been challenged. Everything that provided stability in their lives had disappeared. They were now lost, unsure of what to do or where to go.

Many of the disciples scattered. Others hid for fear that they too would be captured and killed, just as Jesus was. None of them could make sense of it, despite Jesus assuring them while he was alive that he would be back.

We too are living in times of great uncertainty. Everything that we could usually count on, whether it be going to school each day, watching the football on a Friday night, or getting what we need from the supermarket, has changed. Most of the things that usually provide routine and stability to our lives have now gone. Where do we turn to in such times?

Perhaps a couple of stories from the New Testament can help us here.

The first is the story of the road to Emmaus (Lk 24:13-35), the story of two disciples who tried to get away from it all. On the third day after Jesus' death they left Jerusalem, clearing out while they could. The second is the story of Jesus appearing to his disciples (Jn 20:19-23), which begins with the disciples locked inside a house because they were afraid. In both of these stories the disciples are reacting to the current situation out of fear. But in both of the stories Jesus appears to the disciples and invites them to react in other ways. He invites them to react with love, with peace, with the opportunity to share.

In these days of uncertainty, we too can choose to act out of fear. Or we can choose to react with love for our fellow human beings, we can react with peace as we spend time inside our own homes, and we can react by taking up an opportunity to share when we make contact with others by making phone calls or sending messages of support.

In the Star of the Sea Catholic community we are called to face the future as people of hope. May the way we respond to the current crisis show that we are indeed people who do not react out of fear but instead react out of love, peace and sharing.

We wish everyone in the community a happy, holy and peaceful Easter.

Holy Week



Holy Week is an important time in the Church year. It is the last week of Lent and our final preparation before Easter, the most important celebration in the Church. Easter is the completion of Holy Week and it ends in the resurrection of Jesus, who conquers sin and death.

As we go into this season and the holiday period we pray that the renewal of life at Easter will bring happiness, good health and peacefulness to all our families.

The main days of Holy Week are:

- **Holy Thursday**, when Jesus instituted Communion and taught us to serve one another.
- **Good Friday**, the arrest, trial, crucifixion, death and burial of Jesus Christ.
- **Holy Saturday**, the Sabbath in which Jesus rested in the grave.
- **Easter Sunday**, when Jesus rose from the dead.

During this time, when we are called to love and be responsible for the care of one another by being absent from Mass, you are invited and encouraged to make use of other creative ways to continue to nourish your relationship with God and your community. Here are some suggestions:
