Pentecost

Pentecost is the culmination of the Easter season and the birthday of the early Church. The feast off Pentecost is 50 days after Easter and the word Pentecost literally means 50. After the death of Jesus on the cross, his resurrection and ascension into heaven, his first disciples were at a loss of what to do next. Before Jesus left them, he promised, "you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

The feast of Pentecost celebrates the day the Holy Spirit descended on the apostles. God knew that when Jesus descended into heaven the apostles would need more than the Gospels. So, he sent the Holy Spirit to be our helper and our strength. The Holy Spirit helps us to look at the needs of the people around us and to serve others. COVID-19 Restrictions

We thank all of our families for the way they have followed the COVID-19 restrictions that have been placed upon schools. Every few weeks we will put a reminder of these restrictions in our newsletter, assuming there are no significant changes. Here are this week's:
