One of the things we need to consider, though, is what teams we are involved in. When we think of teams we automatically think of sporting teams, but there are other teams that each of us are involved in every day.

First and foremost, we are a part of our family's team. So we ask ourselves, am I committed to helping my family reach its goals, whatever they may be? Sometimes the behaviour of children is as such that goals aren't met very easily. The goal can be something as simple as doing the grocery shopping together, but when children are grabbing chocolates off the shelf or complaining or running off, it can be very hard to reach the goal. In the end, the goal of all families is probably to be able to live together in peace and harmony. But are all members of the family team aware of that, and do they contribute to reaching this goal?

I reminded the secondary students last week at assembly that they are also part of the school team, and our goals are to learn in a safe and welcoming environment. However, when a few people are not creating a welcoming space, or are not allowing others to learn effectively, then they let down the team. They are not committed to the success of the team.

Teenagers can sometimes be very individualistic and only have their own goals in mind. Unfortunately some teenagers have encountered great trauma in their life and, as such, have the perception that everyone is against them so they can't possibly work with others in a team situation. There are no quick fixes for these children, and only time and patience and a sense of feeling safe will start to

overcome these difficulties.

Finally, we hope that families and school are part of the same team working together to reach the same goal - that the students of Star of the Sea can become welcoming and compassionate people, ready to face the future as people of hope. If either the school or the family are not being supportive of this goal, and leaving the other to do the heavy lifting, then it is unlikely our goal will be achieved.

Thankfully in our Star of the Sea Catholic community there are good conversations that occur that enable the school and the families to work together as a team. Often each week we are making phone calls home to let families know of difficulties that students have had during the day, and families are very supportive of what we are doing to help to improve the situation. In the end, we are all committed to contributing to the success of each individual student.

This week across the world different Christian denominations come together for a 'Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This prayer movement began in 1740 when Christians from different countries were asked to pray together for a better world. It has been celebrated across the world by Christian denominations since 1968.

This year's theme comes from the ecumenical community in Minnesota in the United States. They chose 'Do Good – Seek Justice' because their community has been deeply and painfully affected by racial violence and murders. They want to promote healing forgiveness and justice with a particular focus on the impact of racism.

With the referendum being held on "The Voice" this theme is particularly relevant this year, as it proposes constitutional recognition of Australia's Indigenous peoples as the First Australians and an invitation to give advice on government policies on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

Jesus was adamant that we, the peoples of the Earth, 'may all be one' despite culture and racial differences; 'love one another' and together to 'do good' and 'seek justice' for all, especially for those who have been marginalised, forgotten or damaged now and in the past - unfortunately, often by our various Churches.

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Deputy Principal's Message

At Star of the Sea we want all students to feel a sense of community and belonging. The concept of Teamwork has been a focus in the secondary area and whilst this has a lot to do with the way we act, it also has a lot to do with the way we present ourselves.

A team presents themselves in a unified manner and works together for a common goal. Teams are often distinctively dressed in a uniform. There are many reasons why uniforms are important. When all members of a group or team present themselves in uniform, it provides a unified sense of community and belonging. Wearing a uniform neatly and correctly shows a sense of respect for the organisation a person is representing.

On our recent School Photo day we saw our school community presented exceptionally well, wearing the school uniform neatly and correctly. We want all students to present themselves this way everyday. Parents are asked to work with their children and the school to support the correct wearing of uniform.
