From the Principal

Every so often it is good for us to stand back and reflect upon the messages which we give our children, especially around the idea of success.

We all want our children to be successful, but we don't often think about what we mean by that. Does that mean we want our children to be famous? We want them to make a lot of money? Or do we want them to have social status? Most of us want our children to be successful at school, but even that can mean different things for different families. For some families it means their children getting high marks, while for other families it can simply mean their children getting through school.

But schools have got to be careful when it comes to the messages they give about what success looks like. Some schools value sporting success, and may even set up Sporting Hall of Fames within their school, where past students who went on to have success in the sporting arena are remembered. But this is problematic. When promoting this to the school as a whole it is suggesting to everyone that, if you achieve success in the sporting arena you will be remembered by the school. If you don't achieve success in the sporting arena, you won't be remembered.

But of course sport is just one area where people can achieve success. People can be successful in many areas of life. They can be successful teachers or nurses, successful in hospitality or successful in raising a family. So if the only "Hall of Fame" that schools set up is a sporting one, we can give the message to the students that being good at serving the community is not important, or being good at raising a family is not important.

Unfortunately, as a country we have been given these sorts of messages for quite a while. Currently, Australia is suffering a nation-wide shortage of teachers. But this is no great surprise given that for many years we have never seen schools set up a "Hall of Fame" for students who have gone on to become teachers, despite teaching having such an enormous impact on many students' lives over the course of a teacher's career.

In the end, schools will set up "Hall of Fames" for what they value. If they value sporting success, it will be for sport. If the school values drama, it will be for acting. If they value fame, it will be for anyone from their school who has become famous! But what if we set up a "Hall of Fame" for people who have gone on to have a big impact in their community for the service they offered? My father was recently in hospital in Victoria, and one of the nurses was (I kid you not) a past College Captain of Star of the Sea Catholic College, George Town. This person had done many things before taking up nursing, isn't famous, but is providing a vital service to that community. Surely this is successful.

Does God want us to be successful? Of course! But God's measure of success is not the same as

ours. Famous people don't get into heaven any quicker than those who live on the margins, like the homeless and forgotten. It is perhaps the reverse! God's measure of success is that we truly become the people God calls us to be, and whether that means we become famous or just simply serve our community as best as we can, we can all achieve the success God wants us to.

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

May the kindness, compassion and hospitality of the Sacred Heart of Jesus bring fullness to our lives and the lives we share with others.



Deputy Principal's Message

Vaping is a health concern that is placing many people around the world at risk. E-cigarettes or vapes as they are also known, contain dangerous, toxic and highly addictive chemicals that can seriously impact developing bodies and is a growing concern in Australia, particularly among children and adolescents. (Lung Foundation Australia, 2023) While the long-term health effects of vaping are not yet known, what is known is that vaping is associated with symptoms such as nausea, vomiting, mouth and airway irritation, chest pain and heart palpitations. (Vaping and Young People, 2023)

Tasmanian laws prohibit the use of e-cigarettes, vapes and smoking in public places. It is illegal to give or to sell e-cigarettes and vapes to a person under the age of 18 and it is illegal for a person under 18 years of age to buy, possess, or use e-cigarettes, including vapes. (Tasmanian Department of Health, 2023)

Smoking and vaping are prohibited at Star of the Sea. Under no circumstances are students to have items such as cigarettes or vapes at school. Students found with these items or found to be using these items at school will be in breach of Tasmanian laws. Suitable consequences will be imposed on students who do not comply with these laws and expectations.


