From the Principal

The Matildas have made it through to the World Cup semi-finals, just one win away from making the final. Whereas a few weeks ago many of us knew the name of Sam Kerr, now we know the names of Mackenzie Arnold, Hayley Raso and Cortnee Vine, who scored the penalty goal that enabled Australia to beat France.

Professional sport can be a funny thing, and our reactions to it can be equally strange. When people in Australia become famous through sport, the first reaction of others is to try to claim them! We try to put them in a box and pretend that we have had something to do with their success. Schools proudly advertise that a particular person attended their school, towns across the country proudly say that they are that sportsperson's hometown. We start to live our lives vicariously through famous people. And while it is good for schools and towns to recognize and celebrate the achievements of these people, it is not so healthy to "claim" them. We start to live a lie when we just assume that our school or town has led to this person's success (it may be the exact opposite), and we start to depend on others to justify our own importance. I'd be very worried if Star of the Sea depended upon the sporting success of past students to justify ourselves! I'm sure we can stand on our own two feet.

The other funny thing about professional sport is that the better someone performs, the more money they make. And while this might seem a sensible thing, it only really happens in sport. People who are good at their sport can make millions of dollars, but other people in the country who are good at what they do don't have this opportunity. People who are good at teaching won't make lots of money, nor will people who are good nurses, or good truck drivers. The difference is, you can't bet on teachers or nurses, and they don't make for interesting TV.

The other thing we perhaps need to reflect upon in all of this is our support of a particular team and how we start to see the opposition teams. It is very easy to fall into the trap of seeing the opposition as "the other," seeing them as something less than full human beings. It also shows our lack of understanding about connections and relationships. When the Matildas play against France and England, they are actually playing against people who, any other week of the year, would be their teammates in soccer leagues around the world. They are not "the enemy," but instead are friends and colleagues and supporters. As spectators, we should view them in the same way.

In our Star of the Sea Catholic community, we need to teach our children to celebrate achievements but recognize that professional sport is there for our entertainment, not for us to claim someone. We are called to have life to the full, and we can't do this if we are living our lives through someone else's achievements.

Deputy Principal's Message

The importance of connection and the importance of feeling safe

Growing connections is the theme for the 2023 National Day of Action Against Bullying, which is this Friday August 18. This theme supports research findings that strong school community connections and social skills are protective factors in the prevention of bullying and help enable positive, help-seeking behaviours in students. Being connected to others is a dimension of human need but it is not the only thing that we need in life. As humans, certain factors need to exist in order for us to survive and other factors also need to exist in order for us to flourish. An American psychologist named Abraham Maslow developed an outline of what these needs are and separated these into different categories. The diagram at the end of this article shows the different levels of needs based on Abraham Maslow's theories. This theory is known as *Maslow's hierarchy of needs*. It makes sense that the essential needs of a human to survive include air, water, food and shelter. Maslow put these things at the very bottom of his hierarchy; without them we would die. Immediately above this level comes our safety needs.

When we think about the importance of a person's safety needs, we can understand the reasons why negative behaviours towards others have such a big impact. Preventing these negative behaviours, such as behaviours that are considered to be bullying, is a really important step in supporting everyone's safety needs. Bullying is the repeated and intentional use of words or actions towards another person or a group of people that causes distress and risk to their safety and wellbeing. Bullying is a deliberate misuse of power and can involve verbal, physical or social behaviour. Bullying can happen in person or online and it can be obvious or hidden. There is a difference between behaviours that are mean and behaviours that are considered to be bullying. The difference lies in the frequency of the behaviour or action, the intention of the behaviour or action and an imbalance of power.

This week at Star of the Sea, we are raising awareness about bullying and respect. These things fit within our PBS focus areas of Safety and Respect. All people have the right to be respected and safe. All people have the responsibility to treat others safely and with respect. The activities students will participate in this week will help to focus attention on what safe respectful behaviour and safe respectful actions look like.

We will also focus on activities that provide opportunities for students to connect with others. Students will be encouraged to join in these activities which will provide an opportunity for them to interact with others in positive ways. Some of these activities will have a sporting focus, which also connects us to the events of the week, such as the FIFA World Cup being held currently in Australia. Other activities such as Breakfast Club connect us through hospitality and the experience of sharing a meal together. Within each classroom, students have the opportunity

everyday to connect with others, through their learning activities and interactions. Being present at school is one of the best ways students can build meaningful connections with other people, as they interact with others through learning, conversation and play.
