## From the Principal

When you look for a definition of a word on Google, one thing the search engine provides is a line graph that shows how often that word has been used over the past 200 years or so. More modern words will show as not being used much in the 1800s, but used a lot in the last 10 years. Some words show the opposite, with them being used a lot 200 years ago but hardly at all today. The use of the word "wheelbarrow" seemed to have hit its peak in 1915, while the word "perchance" was big in the 1840s but is hardly used today.

Two weeks ago was *Loneliness Awareness Week*, and when you type in "loneliness" something strange appears. While the word has certainly been in use over the past 200 years, it is in the last 30 years that the use of this word has skyrocketed. This is strange because we are supposed to be more connected than ever. We have the ability to talk to people wherever and whenever we want. But it would seem that loneliness is being discussed more than ever.

Feeling lonely is different to being alone. In a recent SBS series set in the Tasmanian wilderness (called *Alone*), a bunch of people were left alone for weeks on end and they had to survive as best they could. Whilst some of them struggled because they felt lonely, many of them didn't mind being alone. Feeling lonely, though, is the sadness that we feel because we do not have friends or company.

Across Australia today, about 1 in 3 people feel lonely, with half of these experiencing severe loneliness, which can lead to depression and anxiety. It seems to affect all states the same, affects men and women equally, and affects young adults and the middle-aged the most.

So why do we feel so alone in the world today?

There is a suggestion by some that social media is playing a role (which fits with the time frame of the use of the word *loneliness*). The reason it can is that we can have lots of digital connections, but very few real-life connections. And while we may get a boost over having lots of friends or likes, they will never be enough to overcome the lack of meaningful connections that prevent loneliness from occurring.

The other part social media plays is that we can look at it and see people doing interesting things or having a good time without us, and that too increases our feelings of loneliness.

In our Star of the Sea Catholic community, we need to teach our children that while social media is handy, it isn't a replacement for real-life friends and meaningful connections. God calls us to be in community. We can only do this when we are physically there, listening with an open heart to those in front of us. It is then we become who God calls us to be. Richard Chapman


## 'Wear it Purple Day'

Children's Book Week first began in Australia in 1945. Almost eight years later, it is as loved by the children and communities who participate now, as it might have been all of those years ago. The theme this year is Read, Grow, Inspire. Reading and being immersed in stories is a critical aspect of language development in children. When children are read to, it helps them to build their language skills and develop the vocabulary of words they know and understand. Being engaged in reading, whether we read to ourselves, or are read to by another person introduces us to new information and new ways of thinking. Reading inspires people to imagine new ideas and promotes creativity.

Sharing in stories with our children builds important connections and helps us to build relationships that are based on shared positive experiences. Children learn a lot about the world around them through their engagement with stories. Stories do not have to be written down, many families and cultures pass on important information and traditions through stories. Take time to share stories in your families, whether they are the stories of your culture and family or those found in a book, the experience will be very worthwhile.
