From the Principal

Last week we informed our community about the death of Leonie Darcy, a past music teacher at Star of the Sea and the organist at our Catholic Church for around 40 years. Her death has got me thinking about the legacy she leaves behind, the importance of music in people's lives, and the lessons we learn from music.

One of the things we often forget about music is its ability to bring people together and to make people feel part of something bigger. Just ask any football fan who has sung their club's theme song at the end of a winning game, or anyone who has joined in with the national anthem, and they will tell you how music can give you a sense of belonging. At school we often sing the Andrew Chinn song, *Light the Way*, which everyone joins in with as it gives them a sense of belonging to the bigger school community.

From that point of view, music in church is no different. Leonie spent about 40 years playing the organ for the Catholic Church in George Town, and it was through her dedication to this task that people were brought together. Whether they liked the music or not, when everyone sang *Here I Am Lord* or *Strong and Constant*, it played a part in building the parish community and everyone left with a smile on their face. I have experienced this myself when doing the music ministry at church, although these days it seems to be *Be Thou My Vision* which gets people singing along.

When we learn music or to play a musical instrument, it teaches us lessons about life. Learning any instrument takes a lot of practice. It takes a lot of time making sounds that don't really sound like music, before making sounds that do. The people who succeed in being able to play an instrument usually have one thing in common - persistence.

With this in mind, music is a lot like life itself. To achieve anything we need to have persistence. We need to be able to keep trying and keep trying until we are able to do something competently. We need to be prepared to make mistakes and fail and be okay with that as it leads us to getting things right.

In our Star of the Sea Catholic community we need to encourage our students to have persistence, to be prepared to make mistakes, and to recognise that they won't be able to produce the "music of their lives" straight away. But we as adults also need to be patient with our students and be prepared to listen to some "horrible sounds" while our children are still growing. It is only through this patience that we can give them the chance to become the people that God calls them to be, and to make "beautiful music with their lives" in the future.
