From the Principal

When you get to a certain time in your life, you come to the realisation that, actually, you don't *own* anything. Or maybe a better way of saying it is, you can't take anything with you when you die. We tend to accumulate a lot of stuff throughout our lives, and every so often we have a clean-out to lessen the amount of stuff we have, but when it all comes down to it, there will come a time when we will die and all of the stuff we have will be worthless to us. Not only that, our relatives will probably end up throwing out or donating anything we did own at our time of death.

So if we don't *own* any of our stuff, what is our relationship with it? Perhaps the best way of describing it is that we are custodians of it. And the more valuable the things we are custodians of are, the greater our responsibility we have to look after them.

I may have the perception that I *own* the house I live in, or the land on which it stands (and according to the law, I do), but really it is just a place I live in and look after until the next person comes along. I am simply the custodian of it. As a Principal, I am very much aware that I don't *own* Star of the Sea in any way whatsoever. I am only the custodian of it, trying to look after it until the next person comes along. And I acknowledge that I am not the original custodian of the school. Many Principals have come before me who have looked after the school, and I am grateful for their stewardship of the school that has enabled me to continue the traditions of Star of the Sea

So who owns Australia? Or Tasmania? Or George Town? Well, no one. All of us are simply custodians of these places, looking after them until the next generation takes the reins and it is their turn to look after them. However, it is good for us to acknowledge the people who have come before us who have looked after these places.

When we acknowledge the previous custodians, it isn't just a case of recognizing them. We can recognize lots of things while doing nothing about them. Instead, it is a case of being grateful for how others have looked after something before us. When we acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land, as we did yesterday at our smoking ceremony, what we are really doing is showing gratitude to all who have come before us, as our Catholic tradition calls on us to do regularly.

Jesus tells us not to store our riches here on earth "where moths and rust consume" (Mt 6:19), but instead store them up in heaven. "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Mt 6:21). If we want our hearts to be full of gratitude, then it is important for us to practise gratitude, towards the original custodians of our land, and towards all in our lives.



Who to Contact

In this week's newsletter we have included a basic guide of who to contact around the school. Schools can often be complex operations and we don't always know the most appropriate person to speak to, so we hope that this guide provides some help to parents, carers and families.

School Communication Procedures

Schools can get busy and we sometimes can be unsure of who the most appropriate person is to contact at Star of the Sea Catholic College. The following, while not covering every possibility, gives a brief guide. Sometimes it may not be possible to speak to the person you want straight away, but by leaving a message at the office the person you want will be able to get back to you.

- Mrs Carmen Robotham (Deputy Principal) for major concerns about behaviour or student wellbeing; for when students are reluctant to come to school.
- Mrs Melissa McGillivray (Student Support Coordinator) for questions about special learning needs, Learning Plans, student wellbeing and NAPLAN.
- Mrs Sally Walters (Curriculum Coordinator) for questions about curriculum and reporting and our literacy strategy.
- Mr Oliver Cook (Year 10 Coordinator) for questions about Year 10 events and activities.
- The class teacher (Primary) for questions or concerns about academic progress or social issues; for minor issues about behaviour.
- The class teacher (Secondary) for questions or concerns about overall academic progress or social issues.
- **The subject teacher (Secondary)** for questions or concerns about academic progress or behaviour in a certain class.
- Mrs Kathryn Condric (Bursar) for questions or concerns around fees.
- **The College Office** for all other questions or concerns. While the people in the office may not know the answer straight away, they will be able to find out from the appropriate person.
- Mr Richard Chapman (Principal) while the Principal delegates certain duties to different staff
 around the College, if you feel your concerns have not been addressed adequately you can book
 an appointment with the Principal to help to address them. Or if you just want to have a chat
 about nothing in particular, you can usually find him on bus duty every morning out the front of
 the school.

From the Deputy Principal

Positive Behaviour Support at Star of the Sea

Positive Behaviour Support, or PBS as it is also called, is an approach to student management that focuses on using positive reinforcement and explicit teaching to support students to engage in positive behaviours. At Star of the Sea we strive to create a safe and supportive environment for everyone in our school community. This includes students and staff. We promote life-long learning to support students to reach their full potential and work in partnership with families in the education and socialisation of students.

In order to create a safe and supportive environment, as a school we have developed a set of expectations that members of the school community are expected to uphold and demonstrate. These expectations are underpinned by our main PBS statement which states that:

At Star of the Sea we are Safe, Respectful, Engaged Learners.



As a school we break down this statement into smaller parts and then focus on what it means to be safe, respectful and engaged learners. Students are explicitly taught strategies and behaviours that promote these three things.

A Focus on Respect

This week our focus is on respect. To support students to better understand how they can demonstrate respect we provide strategies that support students to be respectful and timely reminders about how to show respect. In the primary school we are using an acronym STARS to help remind students how they can sit respectfully and show respect during assemblies and classroom learning time. STARS stands for: Sit Tall Attentive Respectful Silent. Our students in the primary school are doing a wonderful job of demonstrating this behaviour regularly in assembly and in classrooms. Please talk to your child about the way in which they are able to be a STAR in our school by showing respectful behaviour.

Another area where we are encouraging students to be respectful is by asking them to follow an instruction the first time it is given. This can be more difficult for some students and this is a reason to practise and continue to remind students of this expectation. So far, many of our students are doing an excellent job of demonstrating this expectation.

In the secondary area we have been focused on creating respectful learning environments. Students are demonstrating a positive response to some of the recently introduced teaching approaches that are being used as part of the Insight work the school has embarked upon.

The outcome of all students engaging positively in these strategies is that our classrooms are respectful, positive places of learning.
