From the Principal

A few years ago a couple of events occurred in my life that had a dramatic change in the way I look at life. One was something that I saw, another was something that I did.

Firstly, what I saw. I was watching an episode of the ABC program, You Can't Ask That. For those who don't know, it is a program where a selection of marginalised or misunderstood Australians are brought into a studio and respond to questions submitted by the public. Through their answers we come to a better understanding of what life is like for these people. This particular episode I was watching was about recovering alcoholics. As I sat there listening to their stories, there was one common theme - none of them, at the time of their heavy drinking, thought they were an alcoholic or had a problem. In fact, it wasn't until something happened in their lives which severely affected their relationship with their families, did they realise they had a problem.

Secondly, something that I did. A few years ago for Lent I decided to give up chocolate. Not particularly original, but I was eating quite a bit at the time. About two or three weeks into Lent, I suddenly realised that my head was a lot clearer. It was like a fog had lifted on my brain. So after Lent I continued to stop buying chocolate but also looked at what else I ate and if I could cut further sugar out of my diet. The more sugar I cut out, the better I felt. But up until that point, I didn't realise the effect the amount of sugar I was eating was having on my body and brain.

What links these two things together? In our lives, we generally think we are going okay. better every day But the reality is, that until something happens that makes us realise that things are not okay, or that things can be better, we will never look to improve things. In other words, we normalise our lives that we fail to realise that we can live our lives in a better way.

We see this in many different areas. We generally think our mental or physical health and wellbeing is okay, and we don't do anything about improving it. And because we are not taking steps to improve it, we never realise how much better we could be or feel. It is not unusual to hear of people in abusive relationships who never look to get out of them, because they have normalised it.

So how do we overcome this? Short of something drastic happening that forces us to change, we have to take the little steps, day by day, to do things which might improve our lives. We have to bring the change about ourselves. Each of us has to admit things can be better, even when we think we're okay. Memory is 26 years old and lives in rural Malawi. As the eldest child in a low-income farming family,



Memory had to take on many household chores and farming activities to support her parents. They struggled to pay for Memory's school fees and school supplies, and Memory often had to walk to school barefooted. With the support of Caritas Australia and its partner the Catholic Development Commission in Malawi (CADECOM), Memory was able to enrol at a technical college where she learnt technical skills in carpentry. She undertook a three-year carpentry course, with CADECOM

supporting part of her tuition and boarding fees. Memory became the first female carpenter from her village.

Today, she works as a carpenter at one of Malawi's largest hydroelectric power stations. With the income from her job, she can provide financial support to her family and inspire other young women in her community so that they may have the opportunity to succeed in a male-dominated industry.
