From the Principal

We are now well and truly into autumn and the nights are getting a little cooler and the days are getting a little shorter. The seasons in Tasmania seem to change suddenly. One minute you are putting sunscreen on to go outside, and the next minute you are putting a beanie on!

Change is an inevitable part of life. Just as the seasons change, so do other things in our lives. Our children grow up, our parents get old, politicians come and go, disasters happen, wars are fought.

We notice these changes but often they are not big enough or sudden enough for us to be greatly affected by them (perhaps the COVID outbreak in 2020 is an exception). We generally just go on living our lives, dealing with the tough things as they arise.

So it is difficult to imagine what a huge change it was in the lives of the disciples when Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday! Every idea that they had held up until then about life and God was suddenly thrown into disarray when this teacher they had followed around until he was crucified suddenly reappeared 3 days later. Not in the form of a ghost, but one who they could touch and share a meal with. Suddenly, everything Jesus had taught took on a new meaning.

2000 years later, it is hard for even the most fervent Christian to imagine this change. The idea of Jesus rising from the dead on Easter Sunday is something that many of us have grown up with. It is an idea that constantly tests our faith - "surely that's just a made-up story, isn't it?" we ask ourselves. But then we see acts of kindness, or we see the beauty of creation, or we truly feel God's presence when we gather in a community of faith, and our faith is strengthened once more.

The early Christians had no doubt that Jesus had risen. Their faith in the event was so strong that they were even prepared to die for their belief. For them they had discovered that even in the darkest of times, there was always hope.

As we journey forward in our Star of the Sea Catholic community, we, too, must remember that there is always hope in the dark times. No matter how bad things seem, Jesus is there to journey with us through it. Our faith will always be tested that's just part of human existence. Many saints have had their faith tested and travelled through the "dark night of the soul." But no matter what, Jesus'

resurrection conquers all - all our fears, all our disappointments, all the times we thought we weren't good enough. Jesus reminds us - we are good enough.

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

From the Deputy Principal

Grade 8 Camp

Last week our Grade 8 students attended camp on the East Coast of Tasmania. Over the three days of camp students participated in a range of activities. The first day of travel took the group via the Fingal Valley, through St Mary's and over Elephant Pass.

A visit to East Coast Natureworld, near Bicheno provided an opportunity to see Tasmanian Devils up close, the devils showed their true nature of being powerful creatures. Did you know the Tasmanian Devil has the strongest jaw crushing capabilities of any animal in the world for its body size, stronger even than a crocodile, according to the staff of Natureworld. Students also had a close encounter with a bossy emu who terrorised Mr Cook and wrestled with students' hands who were holding food. During a visit to the bird enclosure, birds perched happily on students' arms, sharing the almonds being offered to them. Hand feeding some of these gorgeous birds was a highlight for many students.

Our travels continued into Bicheno and we visited the blow hole and climbed to the top of Governor's Lookout, taking in the view over Bicheno. Next it was time to collect a few items from the local IGA supermarket and then set up our tents and camping sites. Jarod, Kobe, Ruby and Alyssa capably prepared the evening meal which everyone shared.

On Thursday, we were up early to head to Coles Bay. The first activity was sea kayaking. Pairing up, everyone shared a double kayak and paddled across the bay from Muir's Beach to Honeymoon Bay. Our group quickly mastered the stability and paddling needed to stay inside the kayak and moved smoothly across the water, working as a team. It was great to see the collaborative way students mastered this task. A brief stop over at the beach enabled everyone to take a well-earned rest before we headed back across the water to our starting destination. A quick refuel and drink break gave everyone time to change into dry clothes ready for the afternoon hike across the Hazards to Wine Glass Bay.

The afternoon walk to Wine Glass Bay was a challenging activity, however, despite the energy and commitment needed, everyone accomplished the walk in a reasonable amount of time, making it up to the saddle to take in the sweeping views of Wine Glass Bay and the mountains beyond. The descent to the beach was quicker and everyone had the chance to relax on the beach before attempting the climb back up. A few students checked the temperature of the water but found it to be freezing and much colder than the water they spent the morning kayaking in earlier in the day. The return climb took some effort and the bus trip back to Bicheno was much quieter, with a lot of people taking a quick nap to recharge their energy.

On Thursday evening we shared a meal together at the Longboat Tavern. This provided a great opportunity for students to reflect on their camp experience so far and enjoy a meal before heading off to the final activity for the day which was the Penguin Tour. At this time of the year, there are not many penguins active in the area. This is because it is between breeding seasons. However, we did get to see a group of penguins come in from the water and make their way up the rocks to their nests. The penguins came within a few metres of our group and we also got to see where their burrows were. It was late when we headed back to camp and as everyone was exhausted we all headed to our tents hoping for a great night of sleep. Friday was our final day at camp so the day began with breakfast and packing up the camp site. Everyone did a great job getting this done quickly which meant we had some extra time to visit Redbill Beach before our morning activities at Bicheno Primary School. Prior to camp, groups of students planned activities to do with the Bicheno Primary School students and once we arrived everyone got organised and ready to run their activities. The primary students loved the games and got involved enthusiastically. We stayed at the school over the recess break and hung out with the younger students while we ate morning tea.

At 11:15 am it was time to begin the journey home. This time we travelled via the Lake Leake Highway and our lunch stop was in Campbell Town. Everyone took the opportunity to explore the park area, grab something to eat and stretch their legs before we jumped back on the bus to travel back to school.

Staff and students had a great time while on camp. Thank you to Mr Cook for all of the organisation that went into planning and preparing the camp experience. A huge thank you also to the students who attended, as you were outstanding ambassadors for our school and for our community.
