From the Principal

The past week for me has been marked by the deaths of three people that I have known at various times since I moved to Tasmania. Some I knew better than others, but all taught me something about what it meant to be human. One of the things that connected all three was that I had taught their relations at some time. But in most cases my relationships with the three wasn't really based on my teaching of their relations, but more so on just knowing each other as human beings.

The season of Lent reminds us that life is full of times of life, death and resurrection. Throughout our lives there are times when things we are involved in are going strong, times when things die off, and, when they do, this allows a chance for new things to develop. In saying that, the time of death for families is never easy, and it is often difficult to see how things will get back to normal. But the reality is that they never return to normal. Life becomes different, not necessarily better or worse, just different.

So it is with schools. As a school we need to be constantly aware of the cycle of life, death and resurrection. Part of this means being prepared to let some things go so new, and often better, things can develop. Our teachers are seeing the death of certain types of teaching so that we can move to more explicit teaching. There was nothing bad about how we were teaching before. It is just a case that explicit teaching has been shown to be better.

Sometimes it is hard to let go. We feel comfortable with what we know, and certainly don't feel comfortable with the unknown. When something disappears from our lives, we enter into the area of the unknown, and this can upset us. We only have to look at our experience with COVID to realise how upsetting that was for all of us to move from the known to the unknown. But if we also look at the COVID experience, which led to the death of a few things in our everyday lives, we realise how things have become different, and it has been okay.

Last Thursday I attended Dining With Friends as our Year 9/10 Hospitality class had helped to prepare the meal, and some students also helped with serving it. At the moment, Dining With Friends is full of life and is serving up to 70 people each week. But it only came about because of the death of Vinnies Van which was coming to George Town but wasn't meeting a need. Out of the death of one thing, something new and better arose.

When someone close to us dies, it is hard. It upsets our way of being. But as a Catholic community we are also a community of hope, and know that there is always new life that comes. It is this constant cycle of life, death and resurrection that leads us to being the people God calls us to be.


access to clean drinking water is scarce in some areas, with many families facing extreme hardship as a result.

Leaia lives with her five children, husband, brother and sister-in-law on the island of Upolu in Samoa. Not having access to a reliable source of clean water caused Leaia a lot of worry. Their home is not connected to a piped water system, so they had to rely solely on rainwater collected in old fridges. When their water ran out, Leaia had to walk with her young children to collect water in buckets and containers from a neighbour down the street.

With the support of Caritas Australia's local partner, Caritas Samoa, a water tank was installed at Leaia's home. She and her family now have a steady supply of clean drinking water at home. Next year, they will also have a toilet built, with the support of Caritas

Samoa, which will further improve their health and living conditions.

"We are very thankful and grateful for the water tank. It has helped us so much and made our daily life easier," Leaia said.




At Star of the Sea we are Safe, Respectful, Engaged Learners.

This week we have continued our focus on being engaged learners. As humans we are life-long learners. Our learning journey begins in the womb and continues throughout our lives. This is true in our work lives as much as it is in our personal lives.

This week a number of staff have continued to expand their learning about the Insight strategies being used in our school, through workshops held in Burnie and Hobart. As more staff participate in these professional development days, the teaching strategies we are focusing on will become more common across all classes. Students may be able to talk to you about the way they are using mini whiteboards to consolidate learning about specific topics. This is one example of how the instructional teaching has slightly changed. The reason staff are using the mini whiteboards is to help consolidate knowledge in students' long term memory through the quick recall of information. Teachers can also quickly check which students understand an idea or concept and which students need more revision or explicit teaching to assist them to fully grasp the concept.
