From the Principal

This week marks Catholic Education Week in Tasmania. It is a time where we get the chance to recognise and celebrate the contribution that Catholic Education makes, and has made, to the state of Tasmania over the past 180 years or so. But it also raises a question for us to reflect upon - what is a Catholic school?

If you asked ten different people what a Catholic school was, you would probably hear ten different answers. But this is not surprising, because Catholic schools are different things to different people, and operate in different ways in different communities.

There are some Catholic schools that sit in prestigious suburbs of Melbourne and Sydney which many of us would need to mortgage our houses for our children to attend. Then there are some Catholic schools around the country where it is totally free to attend.

There are some Catholic schools where students wear fancy uniforms each day and have long waiting lists, while there are others who serve students who have dropped out of other schools and require flexible learning.

There are Catholic schools that are one of many schools in a certain area, while there are other Catholic schools which are the only school in town and provide education for everyone in that town.

There are Catholic schools where everyone who attends is Catholic, and there are Catholic schools where the population of Catholic students is close to zero.

There are Catholic schools who run independently, with no oversight by any Catholic Education Office, and there are others (like ours) who are part of a bigger system.

And just like the varying schools, there are varying attitudes towards them by parents. Some parents would only ever send their child to a Catholic school, while other parents say that they will never send their child to a Catholic school. Some parents send their children to Catholic schools because they went to one themselves, while others send their child to a Catholic school because it suited the needs of their child and it is their first experience of a Catholic school.

So what ties them all together? What defines a Catholic school?

There is no easy answer, but at the risk of generalising, perhaps the thing that binds Catholic schools together is that they meet the needs of the communities they serve. Those needs vary greatly, depending upon each community, but the school is there to meet them. And when there is no need anymore for a Catholic school in a particular community, it closes down and the people move on to meet the next need, just as has happened in the past in Tasmania and around Australia.

So that's why Star of the Sea is still here and is still going strong, 68 years later - it is still meeting the needs of the George Town community. Whether the need be for our Catholic

education, or because of our 5-day Kinder, or because a student doesn't quite fit into another school, or because of our care and concern for those with learning needs, we are still needed.

And that is something worth celebrating this week.
