From the Principal

It would seem that after all these years of human existence, and no matter how much we think we have progressed as a human race, one thing has remained the same people just want to be noticed.

Scroll through the feed on your social media of choice and you'll find a common theme of people just trying to be noticed. Random people are doing random things in the hope that people will notice them and give them likes. Random people taking videos of their children and uploading them in the hope that they will be noticed.

We seem to have this great desire to be affirmed in what we are doing. We want people to agree with us so that we feel we are on the right track. If I do this dance, or make this comment, or tell this joke, or my cat does this, I'm hoping for lots of likes because that will tell me I'm okay.

When did we stop believing we were okay? When did we lose confidence in ourselves as human beings? And when did we start looking down upon people who are confident in themselves and label them as strange?

Because having confidence in ourselves does not mean we have to be mean or overpowering or bossy. It just means we know who we are and what we are about.

Myself and Mrs Robotham have been teaching the Year 9 Consent class, which sees us trying to engage the students in thinking about who they are and what they think is important in their lives. Why do we do this as part of Consent? Because if people know who they are and what they are about, then they can be confident in the decisions they make within relationships. If we are not confident in ourselves, the challenge of consent becomes much harder.

It is probably no great surprise that schools are being asked to teach students consent in an era of declining confidence. The struggle for schools and families will be trying to restore that confidence back into our children. When they are bombarded every day by images and videos that make them feel lesser than everyone else, it is no wonder our young people can be lacking in confidence. Even those who appear confident are often struggling to really feel that way.

It is also a good year for our Jubilee year theme - Pilgrims of Hope. With hope comes confidence. If we lose hope in the future or ourselves, we lose confidence along with it. So if we really want to bring back the confidence of our young people, we also have to bring back their hope.

As a Star of the Sea Catholic community we need to keep giving our young people

messages of hope. We need to keep reassuring them that they have a say in their future and that they have control of their lives. Our Vision statement talks about us facing the future as people of hope. We need to live this out every day to be the people God calls us to be.

He has shown the power of his arm, He has routed the proud of heart.


He has pulled down princes from their thrones and exalted the lowly.

Emotion of the week

Curiosity

We feel curious when there is a gap in our knowledge about something that interests us, and we become invested in closing that gap through exploration and learning. (Brené Brown, Atlas of the Heart)

We may not know why dogs wag their tails so we feel we need to do some exploration about this to find out why. That's being curious.



- Any number of players can join, as long as everyone can fit in the pit and stand touching the wall at the beginning. Sometimes it may be necessary to limit the number of kids and ask them to line up outside, first-come, first-served.
- To start, a referee or any player tosses a ball into the middle. On the first and second bounces, everyone yells, "Ga!" On the third bounce, they yell, "Go!"
- Once the ball is in play, any player can hit or slap the ball with an open or closed hand. Everyone may move around the pit as they play.
- Players cannot hold, throw, or scoop the ball, only bounce or roll it off the ground or wall.
- A player can only hit the ball once, unless it first bounces off the wall or another player.
- If someone catches the ball before it bounces, the person who hit the ball is out and must leave the pit.

- When a player is hit by the ball on or below the knee, they're out. This includes getting hit by a ball after it bounces off a wall or another person, even if you bounced it yourself.
- of the ball hits above the knee, the player stays in.
- of the pit, they're out of the game.
- Using the wall: Some rules allow players to use the wall to jump higher, while others state that if you do, you're out. Decide in advance which you prefer (it may depend on how sturdy your pit is).
