From the Principal

I used to enjoy watching the opening monologue of Jimmy Kimmel on his TV talk show, Jimmy Kimmel Live! That was until last week when his TV show was pulled off air by his network due to a comment he made on it about the death of Charlie Kirk, or more specifically, about the reactions of people to it. I don't really get the context of the comment or why it was offensive, but Jimmy Kimmel wasn't the first talk show host to be taken off air, with Stephen Colbert also having his show cancelled.

The link between both of these is the belief, rightly or wrongly, that these shows have been pulled because of the influence of Donald Trump on television networks. He has been a big critic of both Kimmel and Colbert, just as they have been big critics of him.

So what has this got to do with Star of the Sea in George Town, Tasmania?

These events in other countries remind us of how important free speech is in our country. We might think that we have a reasonable amount of free speech, but in different situations we may not find we do.

Some people might be in a workplace where they are afraid to speak up about something which is wrong in case they get fired. Some children in families may be afraid to tell their parents how they feel about something in case their parents get angry with them. And even in school, some students might be afraid to share their thoughts in class because they think they will be ridiculed.

Every time we are afraid to have our voice heard, it means we don't have free speech. Because free speech is not about just saying whatever you want. Free speech is about contributing to conversations respectfully with the expectation that we will be listened to respectfully. Free speech is not about marching down the street with placards saying immigration should stop if the voice of the migrants is not being heard. Free speech is not about abusing people on social media but about having the responsibility to become informed about issues before giving an uninformed opinion.

Some may say that the current President of the United States is curtailing free speech by trying to shut up everyone who disagrees with him and surrounding himself with "yes men." I can't comment on that, but we need to recognise in our own lives the times when we don't allow free speech. Are there times when, because we don't want to hear what others have to say in case they disagree with us or they challenge us, we don't allow others to be heard - in our workplaces, families or schools?

Ironically for us, Jesus was an early victim of speaking up. His message of love was too radical for some and they silenced him by hanging him on a cross in case they lost power. And while we may think that seems a world away, every day of our lives we need to let people's voices be heard and we need to be respectful in letting our voice be heard.

In our Star of the Sea Catholic community, let us not forget our responsibility to let each other speak freely, especially our children. Because when we model free speech to them, we have more hope that the future will be a place where all can be heard.

Digital Footprints, Social Media Restrictions and Online Safety

Whenever someone uses an online environment they are creating a trail of information about themselves. This trail of information shapes what other people know about a person. It also shapes what other people think. A digital footprint presents information about a person that can shape the way they are perceived now and into the future. The information that is shared online does not disappear. It is important to understand this and to think about what the impact is of sharing certain information online. This includes information that is shared on platforms, websites and social media. Once information, images and ideas are shared in an online environment, an individual loses control over who has access to those things.

Many people have had concerns about the consequences of young people using certain websites and social media platforms. As a result, the Australian Government has taken steps to limit access to a number of platforms for young people. The government has advised these restrictions will come into effect at the end of 2025.

"The restrictions aim to protect young Australians from pressures and risks that users can be exposed to while logged in to social media accounts. These come from design features that encourage them to spend more time on screens, while also serving up content that can harm their health and wellbeing." (esafety Commissioner, 2025)

With this in mind it is a good idea for parents to conduct a review of the type of access your child has to online environments. A growing number of platforms that children regularly access have the potential to expose them to unsafe experiences.
